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already/just/still/yet/never/ever

Already	 Something that happened before now. Something that happened before it was expected. IT IS NORMALLY IN AFFIRMATIVE SENTENCES
Just	Something that happened very recently. IT IS NORMALLY IN AFFIRMATIVE SENTENCES
Still	• Something has/has not happened up to this moment. CAN BE USED WITH OTHER TENSES LIKE SIMPLE/CONTINUOUS ONES
Yet	Something we expect(ed) to happen. WE USE IT IN NEGATIVE AND INTERROGATIVE SENTENCES THIS EXPRESSION CLOSES THE SENTENCE
Ever	 Evaluates if something has occurred previous to now. Denies that something has occurred previous to now. IT IS USED IN NEGATIVE AND INTERROGATIVE SENTENCES
Never	Denies that something has occurred previous to now. IT GIVES A NEGATIVE VALUE TO A SENTENCE WERE THE VERB IS AFFIRMATIVE.
